Fun

Using a puppet to tell the story and move about, can make the story more interactive and engaging. If reading becomes a chore, or something to tick in a record or book, your child is less likely to want to read. Reading is the biggest step to helping your child succeed in learning and so finding enjoyment in reading is a huge part of reading for pleasure.



Showing understanding

Asking your child to retell a story shows if they have understood it. It shows if they followed the events, understood the language and the sequence of events. It can be quite hard to retell, and using a puppet to re-enact it is often easier. Children can move it about helping them process the actions in the book and will often repeat the language.

If the character has jumped from the page in puppet-form, you and your child can ask them questions and find out more about them and the story. If the puppet (or you) don't know the answer it is an opportunity to find out together.
